Is it enough to simply go to the Moon and put a flag there? Or does the *way* in which this is done matter? If it was done with or without honour – does this matter? Perhaps not to some people. But what about others? And to the next generations? To the history books? That mission with stolen technology now becomes a testament, a permanent record. Perhaps to those who try to steal the technology it does not matter now how that technology is secured, so long as they get it. But what of a few years down the line when these people gain some measure of self-awareness? What then? And what of others who already have a level of self-awareness, people for whom the journey is important? For whom honour is important? How would they feel if they knew that children were killed, lives were destroyed in order to steal the technology that now carries that flag up into space?

Is the *manner* in which something is achieved important? Or is it only the end result that is important? How does this reflect on one's county? One's people?
